Easter in Poland

Holy week lasts from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday. On Holy Wednesday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday (in Poland it's called Wielki Piatek) and Holy Saturday, as well as Easter Sunday, church plays a big role in families who are Roman Catholic and that would be approximately 90% of people in Poland. Egg coloring takes place on Good Friday, a day of fasting. On Saturday, the Easter basket filled with food such as kielbasa, ham, hard boiled eggs, bread, babka, butter lamb, will be taken to the church in the afternoon for a blessing. Once the food is blessed, it is eaten on Saturday. The blessed food will also be served on Easter Sunday. No food is ever wasted. There could also be a cake in a shape of a lamb to symbolize Christ.

Pisanki - the coloring of eggs where eggs are dyed and decorated with folk art that vary by region, and the tradition goes back centuries. Eggs symbolize spring, renewal and fertility.

Easter Monday is a family holiday and it's called Smigus-dyngus, or Wet Monday, in Polish – Lany Poniedzialek. Men and boys sprinkle water on girls. Traditionally the single girls get picked to get wet.

Apologies to Swiss watchmakers

Visitors to Poland generally have a good time and the time tourists spend in Poland will be much better from this day forward. It's all due to Poland's new optical atomic clock. Scientists say it will keep better time than all previous clocks.

The incredibly accurate clock is ticking away at the National Laboratory for Atomic, Molecular and Optical Physics (KL FAMO) in Poland. Actually, it's not really ticking because this is an optical atomic clock. But, this one is so accurate that it would take billions of years to reach an error of one second. To put this in perspective, if you started this clock at the moment of the big bang, it would have lost only about one-tenth of a second by now.

There won't be a nightstand version of this clock anytime soon. It's so big that this timepiece occupies four rooms at KL FAMO. The design of the clock shoots laser beams at suspended Strontium isotopes, which have an atomic half-life that is measured in billions of years. Optical atomic clocks are brand new technology, but they are so much more accurate than the traditional atomic clocks laboratories use for time-based experiments all over the world.

Having a highly accurate way of tracking the passage of time that goes by quicker than the blink of an eye is of vital importance when testing aspects of general relativity and particle physics.

Now that's something you can set your watch by.

Polish Film Wins the Oscar

For the first time in the history of the Academy Awards, a Polish film, IDA, won the Oscar for Best Foreign Film in 2014. Poland has a long legacy of outstanding films and this first was long overdue.

Ida takes place in Communist Poland during the



1960s. Anna, an orphan raised in a convent, is about to take her final vows as a nun. The Mother Superior suggests that she visit her only estranged surviving family member, Aunt Wanda, before the vow ceremony. A religious and shy Anna goes to see her and finds out

that she is Jewish and her real name is Ida. Her parents perished in WWII.

Wanda and Ida journey to their old family house to find out what actually happened. Wanda is a Communist prosecutor, an alcoholic, and is a nononsense person who is determined to find out the fate of Ida's family. She is not well-liked, but doesn't take no for an answer. Evidently the parents were murdered and the house is now occupied by a farmer who claims to know nothing about the former owners.

Do they find out who did it? Do they find their burial place? Will Ida turn her back on Catholicism because she is Jewish? Will she return to the convent? What happens to Wanda? You will just have to see for yourself if more dark secrets are unearthed.

Ida was photographed in stunning black and white. You are really in Poland with its bleak landscape in the 1960s. This is a personal tale of moral and spiritual awakening. The film is the latest from Polish director Pawel Pawlikowski. It is 80 minutes long and is in Polish with English subtitles. Ida is available from the Toledo-Lucas County Public Library. It can also be purchased from Barnes & Noble or ordered online.
